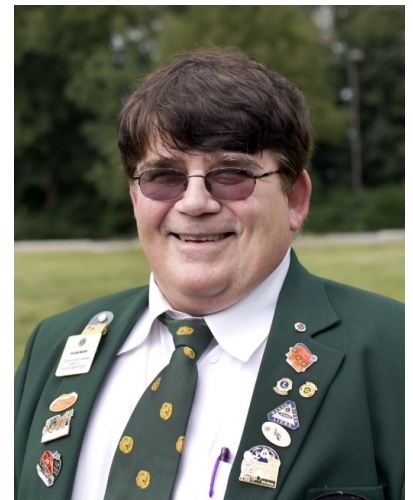

- **Leo Zone:** Leos, Leo Advisors and Leo Chairpersons can use this link to find resources for leading your Leo club, planning projects, promoting your activities and more.
- **2015-2016 District Directory:** This will link you to a copy of the most current version of the District Directory.
- **Newsletter:** This will link you to a copy of the most current version of the District Newsletter.
- **State Tax Exemption Form:** When clicking on this link a copy (which can be printed) of a "PA Sales Tax Certificate of Exemption Form" will be displayed. Use this form for Club functions and purchases and no PA Sales Tax will be charged.

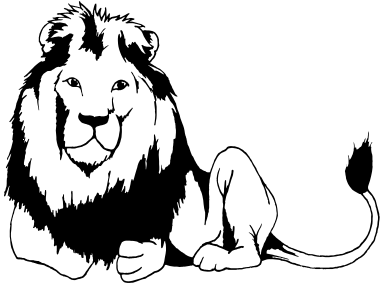

**2015 marks twelfth year that the Manheim Township Lions Club in partnership with the Manheim Township Leo Club and Lions District 14-D has donated Lion's Quest curriculum materials to the Manheim Township School District.** This donation of workbooks has saved the school district and community more than \$27,000 over the last 12 years, The Manheim Township Leo Club Seniors would have been in the first grade when this program was first introduced.

Attached is an article from Lori Shenk. the Quest teacher and an article from our current Leo President Ross.



### **MANHEIM TOWNSHIP LEO PRESIDENT ROSS RECALLS HIS EXPERIENCE WITH QUEST**

As a senior looking back on the past, Quest was one of the most impacting classes in my life. While I don't remember facts about Mayan civilizations from my 6th grade history class, I do remember many of the lessons Quest taught me. In 6<sup>th</sup> grade I never understood the importance of the class, in 6<sup>th</sup> grade you don't care about the information on assorted drugs and the dangers of alcohol, because you assume none of your classmates would ever succumb to such things. But as time goes on, people change. And while some of my peers changed in negative ways, Quest taught me that for every negatively changed person, there are at least ten positively changed people. So while I felt like I was losing friends, Quest provided me with a ways of avoiding temptations and surrounding myself with people that wouldn't inhibit my success. So in conclusion, I liked Quest because it was a fun class but because it also prepared me for the future.

## **2015-16 QUEST PROGRAM BEGINS ITS TWELFTH YEAR IN MANHEIM TOWNSHIP SCHOOLS FOR THE 6TH GRADE CLASS**

At Landis Run Intermediate School, we're gearing up for the 2015-16 school year and another dynamic year of learning in our Quest: Skills For Adolescence class.

This year will mark the 12th year in a row that the Manheim Township Lions Club in cooperation with Lions District 14D has supported our local Quest program by purchasing a workbook for each Quest student. Joining forces with these two groups has been the Manheim Township High School Leo Club each of the last four years. Talk about tangible support! The Manheim Township Lions Club has received matching funds from Lions District 14-D to purchase 500 Quest workbooks each of the last twelve years. Four years ago, the Manheim Township Leo Club, sponsored by the Manheim Township Lions Club at the Manheim Township High School, joined the cooperative effort by making a financial contribution toward the workbook purchases each of those last four years. High school Leo Club members participated in the Quest Program when they were students in sixth grade. This cooperative effort of purchasing the Quest workbooks for the 440 to 480 students who go through the program each year, has saved the school district and the Manheim Township community more than \$27,000 over the past twelve years. Thank you so much for this meaningful support all these years!

If you were to stop by the Quest classroom this year, you'd likely experience our safe, caring, and respectful classroom environment, one that encourages good conversation, active listening, and class discussions that are meaningful, real, and deep. You'd see students learning skills they'll need for tackling their teen years.

You'd watch students sharing their talents, or listen in as students identify their values and figure out how those values could point them in the right direction when they're at a decision-making point. Or maybe you'd join a discussion about the effects of underage drinking, or how tobacco or marijuana can affect a young person's health and growing body. Maybe you'd even answer students' questions about what it was like for you when you were in your teens!

By the time you were done visiting, you'd have a taste of what it's like to be a sixth grader in today's world.

What is it like to be a sixth grader? Sixth grade Quest students at Manheim Township will tell you, if you ask them. Here's a sample of some of their answers to the question: What are your thoughts and feelings about entering early adolescence?

"I am getting older and getting a bit more responsibility. Sixth grade is great. You have nothing to worry about. I am a little nervous, but also excited to get taller. Honestly, I think that Quest is very helpful, because you get to understand what people are going through and how it relates to you. Just so you know, I feel like I am so lucky to have Quest."



“I learned this year, it doesn’t matter what your clothes, hair, and outside looks like. It’s what’s on the inside that counts.”

“I felt nervous and very much like no one knew me and everyone was mean. Now it’s a little easier with Quest.”

“I agree with the paragraphs in the workbook. That whole one paragraph is exactly like me -- and my parents hate it when I have an attitude. They always ask me what’s wrong and I say nothing and it’s true. I really don’t know what’s wrong. Words just come out and I don’t know exactly what I’m saying and I don’t really mean it. I really thought I was like anti-social or something, but when I read that workbook paragraph, it got my attention. I read it to my parents and they said that they did not know that.”

“I agree with the people in the workbook. My family thinks I am happy but the next minute I am mad.”

“What is it like being me? Well, I think for me it is like great, but terrible, because I love school and my friends, but I always worry about “....wait -- am I popular or not? Am I cool enough?” Also, my parents are divorced and I live with my mom and I miss my dad.”.

“My answer is no, no, no! I want to stay a child forever. I like my life how it is. I have no trouble staying me forever. Sixth grade is great, but it means I am growing up. Don’t make me grow up!”

“I like sixth grade, and I love Quest. It’s weird, knowing you’re not the little kid you used to be. You’re growing up! Changes are weird. Soon I’m going to be on my own. SCARY! I like how Quest is teaching us to become more comfortable with growing up. Some old friends don’t talk to me and don’t look at me. Do they still like me? Are they “too cool” for me?”

As you can see, each sixth grader has a unique story, perspective, and experience to share with others. In Quest class students have space and time to consider who they are and who they want to become. The compelling Lions-Quest curriculum invites students to do so. Thank you to the Manheim Township Lions Club for providing workbooks to our students all of these years! What a privilege it will be to work and learn with another group of students in Quest class this year!

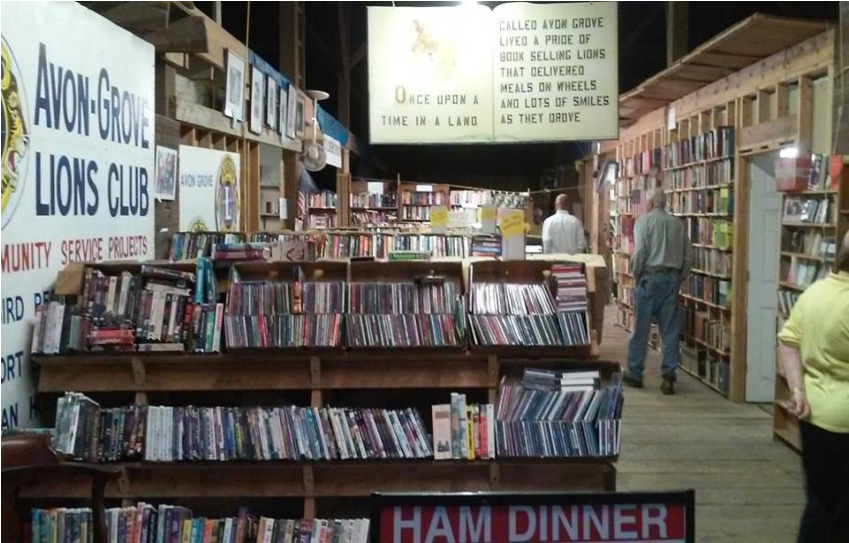
