A Message from District Governor Deb Keeports


Hello Lions and Leos!

Message from the 1st Vice District Governor Steve Lowe

Hello fellow Lions!

I am writing this message from my hotel room in Detroit, Michigan. I am currently spending the weekend at the Leader Dogs for the Blind facility, where we spent the day learning all about what the Leader Dogs program is all about and how we partner with them to provide 100% free of charge services to the blind and vision impaired. That being said, I am NOT going to talk about the Leader Dogs program in this message. I am saving that one for next month. For this month's message, I will talk about the Mission 1.5 Seminar I attended two weeks ago in Orlando, Florida with IPDG Mike Schaeffer and DG Deb Keeports. Along with the District Governors, Global Extension Team District Chairs, and Global Membership Team District Chairs from not only all of our Pennsylvania districts, but a HUGE contingent from across CA-1, which is the United States, outlying territories, and the Caribbean Islands, we focused on Mission 1.5 and the goals for our Constitutional Area, Multiple Districts, and Districts. We met Lions from Alaska, California, Hawaii, Guyana, and Nova Scotia, among a ton of other states. My home state of Tennessee had a contingent there and I connected with several of them to give them a hand with a project they have planned in my hometown. One of the highlights of the conference include how to grow a club: Focusing on your growth goals, opening club branches and specialty clubs, partnering with other organizations, and identifying like-groups such as churches, businesses, and other community organizations such as EMS and first responders.

District GMT FVDG Steve found a Lion to share his Lion spirit with.





If you set up a recurring monthly donation, I will bring you whichever pin you will earn by the end of the year. \$5 recurring monthly donation = Bronze Pin; \$10 recurring monthly donation = Silver Pin; \$17 or more recurring monthly donation = Gold Pin

LIONS OF PENNSYLVANIA FOUNDATION

Meeting of the Foundation was held in Harrisburg on Saturday, July 20, 2024. Besides the members of LOPF, we had PDG Robert Mitchell from 14-F. He will be replacing retiring Board member PDG Gene Shalhamer from 14-F. Also attending was Lion Dan Harper from 14-T, a former member of the Delaware Foundation in 22-D.

Our treasurer, Lion Mark Tomco, reported we have \$1,454.81 in the Disaster Account which is to be used for any incident in Pennsylvania. In the Grant Fund, the amount at the end of June 30, 2024, is \$36,599.02. An additional amount of \$125,000 will be available as of July 1, 2024. That will be available for Grants until June 30, 2025.

Our investment counselor, Lion Ed Wagoner, reported that the balance in the Merrill Lynch account is \$2,224,325. In the American Funds account, which will be eliminated, is \$6,863. That gives us a total invested for our Fellowship Funds of \$2,231,188. This is an increase 17.69%. In the Liability Funds account, which is the funds invested from Clubs, District and Lions affiliated organizations, they showed an overall increase of 18.33%. All organizations have been notified as to the status of their investments.

When it comes to Grants issued, from June 30, 2019 to June 30, 2024, the Foundation has provided \$600,984 to Lions Clubs and Districts to assist them with their community projects.

Our Executive Director, Lion Wade Markel, reported on the Gold Standard Program. This being the first year of this District program, 5 Districts responded to the program and will be recognized at our annual LOPF banquet October 25th.

Six Grant requests were reviewed:

Grants for 14-L for roof upgrade, !4-E for Reading Under the Stars, 14-G for improving parking lot and 14-J for compression device for the fire company were approved.

Grants for 14-A and 14-F were tabled at this time for more information.

Our annual banquet will be on Friday evening, October 25th at the Red Lion Hotel in Harrisburg. As always, the 1st Vice District Governors and their spouses/partners will be our guests.

Our next meeting will be Saturday, October 5, 2024 at the Best Western Hotel in Harrisburg. If you know of any requests for Grants, please have your clubs and your District submit them as soon as possible.

9 Ways to Prevent Hearing Loss

Many adults eventually realize they're pressing the "volume up" button on the TV remote more often, or that a lot of people around them need to speak up. While there are plenty of myths about hearing loss, there are two common reasons people start to lose their hearing:

Age: As you get older, the tiny hair cells in your inner ears slowly break down and can't pick up sound vibrations as well as they used to.

Noise: A lot of loud sound over time can damage the hair cells in your ears.

The good news? You can do some things to avoid noise-induced hearing loss and keep age-related hearing loss from getting worse. Here are eight tips to help keep your ears as sharp as possible.

1. Avoid Too Much Noise

How loud is too loud? If you have to shout over the noise around you, it's loud enough to damage your hearing. Sounds from motorcycles, concert speakers, power tools like saws and drills, earphones, and more are all loud enough to make a difference.

2. Be a Quiet Enforcer

Think about buying appliances and devices that have low noise ratings. And if it's too loud in the movie theater, restaurant, or any other place you go often, ask the manager to turn it down. It's a good idea to carry earplugs.

3. Limit Loud Sounds in Your Life

Sometimes you can't avoid the blare of an ambulance siren or the jackhammer on your street corner. But it's best to limit the amount of time you're around them. Noise-induced hearing loss is a result of the loudness of sounds and how long you hear them.

4. Wear Hearing Protection

If you know you're going to be around loud sounds for more than a few minutes, think about wearing protection, such as:

- Earplugs. Usually made of foam or rubber, they go in your ear canal and can reduce noise by 15 to 30 decibels. You can buy them off-the-shelf or have them custommade to fit you. Some earplugs lower noise levels evenly across all frequencies. They're useful for people who need to make sound quieter but undistorted, such as musicians.
- Earmuffs. These fit completely over your ears and reduce sounds by about 15 to 30 decibels. They have to fit tightly over both ears to block sound.

You can also wear earplugs and earmuffs together for even greater protection.

Have custom molds made for your earphones.

If you often listen to music on earphones using a portable music or video device, it's a good idea to have custom earphone molds made. There are relatively inexpensive custom ear molds that conform to the unique shape of your ear canal and attach to the earphone's wires. You will find the sound truly superior as the custom ear molds will block outside noise, allowing for better quality listening.

A variety of custom ear molds are available for use with earphones, while others are designed for musicians and people who are exposed to noise. Your audiologist can help you select the best style for you.

5. Don't Smoke

Tobacco can make you more likely to lose your hearing, too, research shows. So if you light up, that's one more good reason to quit. If you aren't a smoker, avoid breathing secondhand smoke.

6. Remove Earwax Properly

A buildup of wax in your ears can muffle sound. But don't use a cotton swab to clean them out -- they can push wax deeper in. Instead, use an at-home irrigation kit to soften wax and gently wash it out. If it gets compacted in your ear, your doctor may need to remove it.

7. Check Medications for Hearing Risks

About 200 drugs can damage hearing, including some antibiotics and cancer-fighting drugs. Even high doses of aspirin can harm your ears. If you take a prescription medication, check with your doctor to make sure it won't make an impact. If you must take a medication that may harm your ears, make sure your doctor checks your hearing and balance before and during your treatment.

8. Have Your Hearing Tested

Make an appointment to get a hearing test if you:

- Have close relatives with hearing loss
- Have trouble hearing conversations
- Are around loud noises on a regular basis
- Often hear ringing in your ears
- You haven't had one before

If you have some hearing loss, you can avoid getting more damage by steering clear of loud noises. If your problem is severe enough, think about a hearing aid or other treatment. Be sure to see your doctor if you have a sudden change in what you can hear that you can't explain. It could be a symptom of other serious medical problems.

Symptoms of Severe Hearing Loss

If you lose hearing, either suddenly or over time, details of conversations may become fuzzy. Sounds will become muffled and gradually fade.


Depending on the cause of your hearing loss, you may also have:

- Pain in one or both ears
- Dizziness or vertigo
- Ringing in the ears, called tinnitus
- Pressure or fullness in one or both ears

Additional Information

Normal hearing is in the range of 0 to 20 decibels. People with normal hearing are able to make out sounds as faint as human breathing, which measures about 10 decibels.

- Mild hearing loss ranges from 21 to 40 decibels.
- Moderate hearing loss ranges from 41 to 55 decibels.
- Moderately severe hearing loss ranges from 56 to 70 decibels.
- Severe hearing loss is in the range of 71 to 90 decibels.
- Profound hearing loss is greater than 90 decibels. People with severe to profound hearing loss will have trouble hearing speech, although they can make out loud sounds like a truck that backfires or an airplane taking off.

Announcement of Multiple District 14's Eligibility to Endorse a Candidate for International Director at the 107th annual Lions Clubs International Convention

"In accordance with MD 14 House of Delegates Procedures, Past International President Joseph L. Wroblewski, and members of the MD-14 International Family announced Saturday, August 3, 2024 as part of the first 2024-2025 PA State Council of Lions Clubs Council of Governors meeting that the Multiple District is eligible to endorse a candidate for the office of International Director at the 107th annual Lions Clubs International Convention in Mexico City, Mexico.

PIP Wroblewski and the PA International Family subsequently requested, and members of the Council of Governors approve, the convening of a House of Delegates session for the purpose of selecting an endorsed candidate for this high office. PIP Wroblewski and the PA International Family also requested and were granted approval by the Council of Governors to hold a special election to determine the Multiple District's officially endorsed candidate for the office of International Director."

According to the Lions Clubs International Bylaws Article II, Section 3, paragraphs a,b,c and Multiple District 14 Bylaws Article 7, Sections 1-6 and the MD-14 House of Delegates Procedure: Revised 7-11-2024 the following are the requirements to be a candidate for the office of International Director:

"Section 3. Candidacy Requirements for International Director. A candidate for the office of International Director shall:

- (a) Be an Active Member in good of a Lions Club in good standing.
- (b) (1) Have completed or be completing a full term or major portion thereof as district governor of a full district of this association; or
- (2) Have completed a full term or majority thereof as district governor or provisional district governor of a provisional district which (1) attained in said term or later twenty (20) clubs in good standing or full district status or (2) has been a provisional district for no less than ten (10) years.
- (3) Secure the certification of endorsement by his/her district (single, sub- and multiple) in accordance with these by-laws or constitution."

Those Lions interested in being considered as a candidate for the office of International Director must do the following:

- 1. Prepare a Letter of Intent and Lions resume in printed form and present these documents to his/her club's Board of Directors for the purpose of receiving the club's official endorsement; AND
- 2. Submit a letter of Intent and Lions resume to the PA State Council of Lions Clubs office, 949 East Park Drive, Harrisburg, PA 17111 prior to October 1, 2024.

After receiving the club's endorsement, those documents must be forwarded to the candidate's District Governor for approval by the sub-district's delegates at a special election called for the purpose of providing the sub-district's endorsement of the candidate.

The letters of endorsement from both the club and sub-district must be dated and signed by the appropriate club and sub-district officers and presented in written form to the State Office, Attn: State Administrator by October 13, 2024.

Upon receipt of the official endorsement letters from the appropriate club and sub-district, the candidate(s) for the office of International Director will be invited to meet with the International Family at the October 2024 Counsel meeting and may officially announce his/her intentions.







A GUIDE DOG STORY - KASSON W., NEW YORK

"I'm 37, I just lost my sight in 2020 just before the pandemic because I was attacked on the subway. I went from seeing to not, just in a day. I'm a people person, I'm a Leo, I used to bartend and I'm the life of the party. I have a close-knit family and I'm a protector. It's been a roller coaster since I lost my eyesight. During the beginning when it was also the start of the pandemic, I thought I would be able to see again, but the eye doctor told me I wouldn't be able to see again. At first, I didn't know there was life after being blind. I have a close-knit family and they tried to do everything for me, and I couldn't handle that. I needed to get past them doing everything which led me to feeling helpless. Then a new season began. It was rough in the beginning; I'm still getting through it... I'm still processing it, but sometimes I think maybe it was blessing because I'm doing things and experiencing things I normally wouldn't do. I feel like new doors have opened for me, everything feels right. I'm going with it and I'm not fighting against it. Leader Dogs for the Blind found me the best dog. I came to get Odyssey because I wanted to be heard. I motivate and inspire a lot of people and now I'm thinking about speaking and helping others."


