

A Message from District Governor Steve Lowe

Hello Lions! I hope that everyone is staying warm and safe with the definite shift to winter weather that we have been experiencing. As I write this, we have over 12 inches of snow that fell between around 3 am on Sunday morning and 1 am Monday morning. It certainly made for an interesting drive to work for me!

Last month, I touched briefly on planning for the future. I would like to expand on that a little this month. As we are working our way toward late Spring and the end of the Lionistic Year, it is time that we start looking at the long-term viability of our clubs in order to serve our communities effectively, not just for the next few years, but well into the next generation and beyond. When we do a little something called "Succession Planning," we are setting ourselves, as well as our next generation of Lions up for success. We are laying the foundation and drawing the blueprint for the health of our clubs. Too many clubs don't make it to a 10, 20, 50, or 100-year celebration. The road of Lionism is littered with clubs that opened their doors but then closed them prematurely.



How do we keep this from happening to OUR clubs? We participate intentionally by stepping up and taking a leadership role within our clubs. As leaders, we need to always be forward-thinking by recruiting club members to fill the positions within our clubs. Additionally, we should strive to have someone to back them up, learning what needs to be done for when the time comes that they take over the position. THIS is succession planning and it helps to keep our clubs running smoothly and doesn't leave a leadership void that we rush to fill with "a warm body". Too many of our clubs are missing people in these leadership positions – Club Secretary, Club Treasurer, Vice President, Board Member. Positions such as Membership Chair, LCIF Chair, and Service Chair should also be filled and have back-ups ready to step in when needed.

How do we accomplish this? Sit down as a club or at a Board of Directors meeting and have an open and honest discussion about where you want the club to be in 5 years. Put these goals down on paper and as a group commit to reaching them. Make them SMART goals: Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time Bound. Also, consider doing the Club Quality Initiative, which can be found on the Lions International website in the Members Resource Section under Membership>>>Club Quality Initiative. Read about it and give it a shot. We grow when we are honest with each other and ourselves. Don't just go through the motions. Make a personal commitment to strengthen our clubs.

I hope that as we move toward Spring, each of you take a minute to think about what you can do to help your club achieve it's goals. I do every single day.

Message from the 1st Vice District Governor Craig Merkey

Happy Groundhog Day Lions,

write this as it is snowing, so I'm not even sure if the groundhog can find his way out of the hole! The good thing is we will soon be out and serving in the community again.

With our State VDG training complete, and District Governor training begins on February 2 for me online, so February will be a busy month as we have training on Mondays and Thursdays.

In the last 2 months I know 2 people that have been scammed and thought I would write about this to help others not let their guard down. Just like all the emails that come from district officers that ask you to help us take care of business, we will never ask you to get us gift cards since the treasurer is busy and can't help us. The key to checking to see if the email is legit, look at the sender's email address. You can verify emails in the district directory. But remember, we won't ask you for gift cards, we won't ask you to transfer money through some online money service, like Venmo, Zelle, Bitcoin or other.

These people are slick, they tell you not to tell anyone since this is a secret, they also try to get your personal information and even want you to go to the bank to get money out and send via wire transfer. Sometimes they tell you that you have a credit and they just need your information so they can credit it back to you. Then when you give them your information they "accidentally" send you too much and insist that you now must return it to them. Being the honest people, we are, of course we would return it, but that is WHERE THEY GET YOU!

One person went to the bank because they were confused and the bank assisted them to hang up and change passwords and accounts immediately. The other person clicked on a link from "their financial advisor" and did not check the email and it was a scam. When they clicked on the link, their computer had all the bells and whistles go off with the Windows blue screen of death with a phone number to call and they called the number. When this happens turn off your computer and restart it. Do not click on that link in the email again. Delete the email. When you call the number they want to connect to your computer to fix the "fake issue." Once you let them connect they have access to everything you have on your computer, your bank info if you save it (Don't save it on your computer), then they tell you they need to update windows and put a fake screen only you see, while they search your computer for accounts, passwords, etc.

Please be vigilant and be careful as you open emails, please don't fall into these scams, they take so much time to set everything up and create new passwords for EVERYTHING. You really don't know how many passwords you have until you have to recreate them all. I can tell you I spent many hours helping clean everything up. I would add that if you have any question if it is legit, please call your bank. They are seeing these things everyday!



LITPC YOUTH SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM
GUIDELINES FOR PIN TRADING CLUBS



1. Application forms and information will be posted on the LITPC website. Identical information will be published in the first LITPC bulletin of the year. Successive bulletins will contain directions to download the Scholarship Application from the LITPC website.
2. It is recommended that each pin trading club establish a Scholarship Committee of at least three members in addition to a chairperson.
3. In areas or multiple districts without a pin trading club, members are encouraged to establish a Scholarship Committee of at least three members and a chairperson. When the Committee is established, please inform PDG Steven Staudinger LITPC scholarship Chair at 24915 NE Stegert Drive, Battle Ground, WA 98604 5337.
4. Guidelines will be released or can be downloaded from the LITPC website.
5. All pin trading clubs will be encouraged to post applications and scholarship information in their bulletins and on their websites. Also, please post scholarship information in your various sub-district bulletins and websites.
6. It will be the responsibility of pin trading clubs to share scholarship information with Leo Clubs in their states/multiple districts.
7. Completed applications will be processed through state and/or multiple district pin trading clubs. In states/areas that do not establish a Scholarship Committee, applications should be sent to the nearest pin trading club as listed on the LITPC website. <http://www.litpc.org/PinTradingClubsPins.html>
8. Each pin trading club may submit four applications to LITPC from their area and four applications from a state/area that does not have a pin trading club.
9. Each pin trading club may designate its own deadline date for the acceptance of applications. A deadline of March 1, 2026 is recommended.
10. Scholarship Chairpersons are encouraged NOT to wait until the last minute to submit scholarship applications to their committee for judging. When 20 or more applications are received, send an equal number of applications to committee members to start prioritizing those they feel are the best applications. Immediately after your deadline EACH committee member can submit their top application to the chairperson. The committee then can select the top two applications to be sent to PDG Stephen Staudinger LITPC Chair at 24615 NE Stegert Drive, Battle Ground, WA 98604 5337 April 15, 2026.
11. Scholarship applications may be duplicated; however, applications which have been altered in any way will not be accepted by the LITPC.
12. The Secretary of the LITPC Scholarship Committee will accept applications postmarked on or before April 15, 2026. The Secretary will select an LITPC Board Member to review all applications for compliance.
13. The LITPC Scholarship Committee will evaluate all applications. Each Scholarship Committee member will evaluated all applications using a point system to determine the scholarship winner.
14. The scholarship winner will be announced at the Annual Meeting of the LITPC.


