"2020-2021 Council Meeting #1 Update"

Dear PA Lion,

The following message is from PA State Council of Lions Clubs' Council Chair Marilyn Wagner and concerns the first 2020-2021 Council meeting:

Out of concern for the health and well-being of our members and their families during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting social distancing guidelines, the first meeting of the Pennsylvania State Council of Lions Clubs' 2020-2021 Council of Governors will be held as a Zoom videoconference Saturday, August 1, starting at 1 p.m..

The Honors Night Banquet originally scheduled for Friday, July 31, at the Red Lion Hotel Harrisburg Hershey has been canceled, as has the "Lunch and Learn" event sponsored by the Northeast PA Lions Service Foundation scheduled for Saturday, August 1.

The Zoom videoconference meeting schedule for Saturday, August 1, will include functions normally part of a state convention schedule but which were postponed due to the cancellation of the 2020 convention in Erie. The schedule will be as follows:

 \cdot $\,$ 1 p.m. – Presentation of Leader Dogs for the Blind "Top Dog" awards.

 1:05 p.m. – Presentation of 2019-2020 MD-14 Leo of the Year Award.

• 1:10 p.m. – Recognition of the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 Council of Governors (condensed version of previous years' Honors Banquets).

1:30 p.m. – Induction of the 2019-2020 Council of Governors into the PA Counsellors organization.

2 p.m. – First 2020-2021 State Council meeting.

An agenda for the August 1 videoconference along with the link by which you can connect to the videoconference will be sent out once they have been finalized.

All committee chairpersons and/or coordinators who will have an Action Item for State Council to consider during the August 1 videoconference must submit that item in written form to the State Office no later than Wednesday, July 15, 2020.

Any Action Item received after that date may, at the discretion of the Council of Governors, be tabled until the second 2020-2021 State Council meeting. Committee chairpersons/coordinators with Action Items must be present or have a representative participate in the videoconference. All oral committee reports to State Council should be limited to 3-5 minutes.

Committee chairpersons and/or coordinators who do not have Action Items for State Council to consider are also encouraged to have their written reports submitted to the State Office by July 15.

2019-20 winner 'deg' into community service

Pardon the pun, but the winner of the 2019-2020 Pennsylvania Lions, Multiple District 14 Leo of the Year award "deg" into community service and has not taken a break since.

Margaret "Maggie" Degler was a founding member of the Avon Grove Charter School (AGCS) Leo Club as an eighth-grade student in September 2015 and immediately accepted the challenge of serving as the club's first-ever president.

Leo Maggie served as president during the club's first two years, was club secretary the following year and vice president during the club's fourth year. She is currently completing a third term as president of the club sponsored by the Avon Grove Lions Club (District 14-P).

Leo Maggie qualified for the state Leo of the Year award by being selected as the top District 14-P Leo.

The AGCS Leo club originated as a middle-school-student-only organization with the membership divided into two groups that met on different days of the week. As club president, Leo Maggie had the challenge of coordinating the collaboration of the groups' efforts.

She passed that test with flying colors and, when she entered high school, helped coordinate team meetings before school, during lunch and after school, and even hosting weekend planning sessions at Starbucks to make sure everyone had an opportunity to attend.

The sponsor of 15 new members in the last four years, Leo Maggie has been an integral part of the success of the AGCS Leo club. She has been involved in almost every activity and frequently came up with her own ideas to add to the mix when she was unable to attend, according to her Leo of the Year nomination form.



"It is worthy of note," the application pointed out, "that Maggie has undergone three separate surgeries during her high school years that left her wheelchair bound for two months and attending physical therapy on a weekly basis.

Leo Maggie also spearheaded or has been an active participant in a project to help raise funds for and awareness of pediatric cancer, assembled and distributed medical alert kits for senior citizens, collected "Wish List" items for the PA Lions Beacon Lodge Camp and coins that led to a \$1,000 donation by Avon Grove Charter School students to Canine Partners For Life, 679 nonperishable food items for The Bridge in West Grove and more than 700 books for the Avon Grove Lions Club Book Barn.

She was also deeply immersed in the design and sale of t-shirts that resulted in the donation of \$900 to Family Promise of West Grove, the collection of plastic products that will be recycled and result in the donation of a park bench by TREX, helped coordinate a Lip Sync Contest to benefit local organizations and assisted with a Special Olympics swim meet at the Jennerville YMCA.

And, as if that weren't enough, Leo Maggie coordinates the club's Instagram and social media efforts and helped organize a students' Random Acts of Kindness initiative to brighten the days of Avon Grove Charter School faculty, staff and students.

While compiling her impressive record of service, Leo Maggie earned induction into the National Honor Society and a Presidential Scholarship to attend Johnson & Wales University in the fall of 2020.

Leo Maggie is the daughter of Dwayne and Tara Degler, who through their involvement with her projects were led to become members of the Avon Grove Lions Club.

Leo Maggie has also guided her principal, a second Charter School teacher and a neighbor of the family into Lionism.

"It has been a great pleasure to watch Maggie grow into her leadership persona," said her father, an AGCS middle-school teacher and the Leo club's advisor who is currently serving as Avon Grove's King Lion. "I believe her involvement with the Leo

As we said at the start of this feature, Leo Maggie has definitely "deg" right in when it comes to community service projects. That is what earned her the distinction of being the 24th winner of the MD-14 "Leo of the Year" award.

Leo Maggie will receive a Multiple District Leos Founders Recognition Award and a \$250 check. She will be honored, along with her parents and guests, during an Honors Banquet July 31 that will be held in conjunction with the first 2020-2021 State Council meeting at the Red Lion Hotel Harrisburg Hershey.



The banquet will also honor members of the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 Council of Governors, who due to the COVID-19 pandemic and cancellation of the 2020 state convention were not recognized at the year-end event as had been the case in the past. Members of the 2019-2020 Council will be inducted into the Pennsylvania Counsellors organization as part of that evening's festivities.

The state Leo of the Year award winner is selected each year by members of the PA State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors from a pool of candidates comprised of first-place finishers in sub-district competitions.

Leos considered for the prestigious award sponsored by Lions Clubs International must demonstrate outstanding leadership skills, achieve a superior record as a Leo in implementing successful service projects and make an identifiable contribution to the development and growth of the Leo Club Program.

Leo of the Year award winners are also expected to achieve distinction in community or school activities outside of Leo club commitments and demonstrate high ethical standards and personal integrity.

Peace Essay Contest

Noor Khraisat chronicles her "Journey to Peace"



Noor Khraisat, a 13-yearold, eighth-grade student at Jefferson Middle School in Pittsburgh, was selected for the second consecutive year as the Multiple District 14 Peace Essay Contest winner.

As the 2019-2020 state winner, Noor received a commemorative plaque and a check for \$250. She also became eligible for a Merit Award from Lions Clubs International.

LCI's Peace Essay Contest, which is in its 10th year of existence, is open to students with vision impairments who are between the ages of 11 and 13 on November 15.

Prior to being named the state winner, Noor earned first place in District 14-B's competition. Her entry was sponsored by the Mount Lebanon Lions Club. The following is the complete text of Noor Khraisat's first-place entry in the MD-14 Peace Essay Contest:

People define the term "Making Peace" to mean making peace with someone one might not have been on good terms with or making peace with the fact that our world is moving toward an entirely digitized lifestyle. However, for me, a thirteen year old girl with a visual impairment, the most important form of making peace is making peace with myself.

I have struggled to overcome many obstacles on my journey to peace. One of my worst internal obstacles that held me back for so long is my urge to prove people wrong. There are times when this was handy like when people doubted my ability to be in honors and I did get in. However, this has also held me back so many times. For example, our family and friends were at a place with a lot of ropes and climbing walls available to climb, and my mother kept saying, "Let's do something else." I, however, refused to listen and tried it anyway. To my humiliation, I kept getting trapped in the ropes. Thankfully, my father was right there when I almost fell. Over time, I had to accept there are some limitations on the physical part of life, but the sky's the limit for my thoughts to soar high. Another obstacle I have continued to struggle with is trying to keep my worst critics' words away. There is a difference

between wanting the best for someone, giving them advice, and just being mean. Through my journey to peace, this has become easier. For example, I have always trusted my parents because they would celebrate me when I succeed at something, and they are not afraid to set me straight when I mess up. On the other hand, I have found that some of the people I have called "friends" would set me up for failure and take pleasure when I would mess up. Although I learned how to block the negative noise from others, I still struggle to block out my own thoughts that scream at me. "DO BETTER!" The negative thoughts have led me to pushing myself over the limits so many times. Once, when I was six years old, a little boy was walking with his mother, and he turned around and screamed something that sounded like "She looks scary. Why are her eyes like that, Mom?" this particular instance is ingrained in my mind because I tortured myself with the thought that the way my eyes appeared was all my fault. I blamed myself for an "abnormality" that society would not accept. I still struggle with these thoughts today, but luckily, I have the most wonderful support system around me.

The most beautiful part about my journey to peace is that it never ends. There is so much to learn and develop about myself. I am always trying to better myself and the world around me.

Why did I mention this? Because Lions' service is finally being recognized in our communities by media that ordinarily would not have considered acknowledging any of our work, and the public is supporting our efforts.

Lions Clubs International Foundation "We Serve During Difficult Times"

During these very difficult times of the COVID-19 pandemic, many Lions, Lioness and Leo Clubs are truly exemplifying the Lions motto "We Serve." Despite clubs not being able to meet in person, many are using technology and being creative to discuss business in relation to serving their community, especially with "Campaign 100," as clubs are continuing to donate to LCIF to help in LCIF's response to COVID-19.



To date, three Districts in Pennsylvania, 14-G, 14-H and 14-W, have been accepted for \$10,000 Emergency Grants to provide first responders with Personal Protection Equipment in their communities. Congratulations to these Districts on moving forward with these grants.

LCIF to date has given out \$3,528,655 in almost 200 grants throughout the world to help Lions Clubs serve their communities in fighting COVID-19. Constitutional area 1, the United States, has received 26 grants totaling \$428,462.

Three Lions clubs to date have committed to being Model Clubs by donating at least \$500 per member toward Campaign 100 by June 30, 2022. They are Arendtsville in 14-C, Shade in 14-M and Rostraver Township in 14-E. Congratulations to these Lions Clubs on this commitment. (FYI: Family units count only as one member in calculating what a Lions Club needs to donate to become a Model Club.)

LCIF has raised \$155 million worldwide toward their goal of \$300 million.

Seven of our Districts in Pennsylvania have already surpassed what they raised last fiscal Lions year. Overall, in Multiple District 14 we are still slightly ahead of last year's donations.

Also, LCIF is now partnering with Kiwanis International, Optimist International and Rotary International to use their combined resources to help those affected by COVID-19 and with those serving on the front lines. The combined membership of the four service organizations is 3.2 million members.

PDG Kerry and I deeply appreciate all your support for Campaign 100 despite challenges, as we are still moving forward to meeting our goal!

"GOOD THINGS HAPPEN"



One of the things we encourage our year-round staff to do at PA Lions Beacon Lodge Camp is to become certified to operate the climbing tower and zip line. This provides our seasonal staffers, who

have less experience, with support they can call on until they become comfortable in their roles as operators. It also means our Camp Coordinator has more flexibility in planning activities, knowing he can rely on more than only the counseling staff if counselors are needed for other activities during the same time. That is how I ended up at the top of the zip line, loading campers and sending them to the bottom.

We had very good participation that day, with lots of Children's Village campers eagerly waiting in line to experience the ride on our 700 feet long, 65 feet high zip line. Many rode two or three times. Throughout the activity I kept seeing one little girl in particular who had Down syndrome. She hadn't left the benches where the Children's Village Unit Director was helping the kids get into their harnesses and helmets. I saw her shake her head vigorously "no" when she was offered a harness. Toward the end of the activity period she came down, carefully, to the fence to watch others take the ride. When she noticed me looking at her, she ran back to the benches and sat looking the other way. The CV Unit Director was seeing this as well, and kept offering the little girl a harness, which she eventually accepted. She made her way to the platform three times, each time running back to the benches and starting to take the harness off. Through encouragement, the Unit Director would help this little girl get her courage back up, and she would try again. The fourth time she came down, she got as far as putting one foot on the platform when she started to cry. She yelled at me, "I don't want to do this!" I told her she didn't have to. She stood there with tears streaming down her face, looking at the cable, the platform, the landing area so far away. She asked to see the trolley. She asked what the "clippy thing" was called. I started talking to her about wanting to do something, but being scared to try. Eventually, through her questions and my demonstrations of how the equipment works together to keep a rider safe, she was connected to the zip line, safety checks done, and the workers at the bottom were ready to assist at the end of the ride. I asked if she was sure she didn't want to ride. She looked at me nervously, beginning to cry again. I told her it was ok if she didn't want to ride, but she'd be happy with herself if she did, and that

everything was ready if she decided to ride. Through her tears, she smiled up at me and said, "You sound like my Dad." Then she turned and took a brave step off the platform to have the ride of her life. She decided to step out of her comfort zone into growth. From 700 feet away I could hear her yelling, "I did it!"

If your club has ever sent a camper sponsorship, you made this happen. If you have ever joined the 500 Club, you made this happen. If you have ever come to help at a work weekend, you made this happen. That important moment in that little girl's life would not have happened without you, a Pennsylvania Lion. This is only one of the stories from a place that has been doing this for 73 years; only one of the triumphs out of hundreds of campers at PA Lions Beacon Lodge Camp, and you make this happen.

Beacon Lodge is a state project of the Lions of Pennsylvania. By being a Pennsylvania Lion, you are making this possible for all our campers. You are giving them the opportunity to take a vacation, learn to make new friends, grow as individuals and get a sense of control over what they do. Next time you have the opportunity, please come visit the place where good things happen. What an incredible thing we, as Lions of Pennsylvania, have built.

Over the past several months, life as we know it was put on hold due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Businesses, schools, families, Lions clubs and Leader Dogs for the Blind had to develop new ways for daily life and operations to continue.

How did the pandemic affect Leader Dogs for the Blind operations?

Leader Dogs for the Blind Canine Development Center may house up to 400 dogs, from puppies to retired Leader Dogs, at any time. In addition to dog care, the canine center is also the home base of the veterinary, puppy development, breeding and maintenance departments and the Leader Dog gift shop.

In the month of March, Leader Dogs had about 150-160 dogs on campus, as of May they have about 70. The dogs were re-homed with staff and volunteers until everyone is permitted to come back to campus. Individuals raising Future Leader Dog puppies have had their dates rescheduled to return their puppies and they get to be with them a little longer. All the puppy raisers were extremely happy to extend their care with the puppies for a wee bit longer.

Leader Dogs has suspended breeding but a few of the puppy litters did come back to the school during the last week of April. Leader Dogs normally have 400 volunteers on campus, but, unfortunately, they are not able to be at the canine center at this time. The Leader Dog staff has taken on the responsibilities of caring for the dogs and puppies in the absence of their volunteers. This has made them come to appreciate their staff of volunteers even more.

The summer months have always been very active for Leader Dogs for the Blind with the Teen Summer Experience Camp and Lions Clubs 1st Vice District Governor's visits. The pandemic is not going to stop Leader Dogs from continuing with these traditions. Leader Dogs for the Blind jumped on the band wagon of virtual meetings. This year both groups will get to experience Leader Dogs for the Blind in a whole new way.

The Virtual Summer Experience Camp is being held June 21st- June 26th for teens 14-17 years old in the U.S. and Canada. The teens this year can expect an exciting line-up using the Zoom platform for all virtual activities. Just like the traditional camp, teens will be exploring mobility options like guide dog travel, building leadership skills and relationships with peers. Participants will receive a Virtual Summer Experience Camp t-shirt and prizes including a Humanware Victor Reader Trek.

The 1st Vice District Governors and District Leader Dogs Chairpersons are going to experience Leader Dogs for the Blind in the same virtual format as the teen experience camp. The virtual tour will take place in August.

Also like many Lions clubs, our normal fundraising efforts have been placed on the back burner, but Leader Dogs for the Blind have found new and inventive ways to continue Lions support. Leader Dogs for the Blind just wrapped up another successful virtual 5k fundraiser.

The COVID-19 pandemic has not slowed down the continuing success of Leader Dogs for the Blind. If you are interested in a Zoom meeting for your clubs please contact Lion Beth Slade, Leader Dogs for the Blind Lions Engagement Coordinator and me to schedule a meeting.

Remember in the heart of every Leader Dog lies the heart of a Lion.

From Paws to Refresh

Liquor not permitted in basket raffles

Please be aware: A popular staple in basket raffles is a "no-no."



After researching the matter with the Executive Director of the PA House of Representatives' Liquor Committee and the PA Liquor Control Board, MD-14 legal counsel Lion Ashley Grimm reported that "liquor is not permitted to be in a basket for purposes of a raffle. This also includes silent auctions.

"This equates to selling liquor without a license," Lion Grimm said. "A wine and spirits gift card is permitted to be included in a raffle basket, though." Lion Grimm's research supported the opinion expressed by Lawrence County Treasurer Richard Rapone in a recent New Castle News story that had prompted MD-14 State Council Chair Bill Morgan to contact Lion Grimm.

As part of the News story, Capt. Jamie Jones of the LCB Enforcement Bureau said including any type of alcoholic beverage – be it a six pack of beer, a bottle of wine, a bottle of whiskey or the like – is a violation of the Pennsylvania Liquor Code, Title 47, and is an unclassified misdemeanor offense. The fine upon conviction is \$500, levied to the organization sponsoring the fundraiser and not the donor of the basket.

In the News story, Rapone pointed out, under the state's small games of chance law, it is illegal to host basket raffles at fundraising dinners used to benefit someone who is sick.

Per capita dues

Lions Clubs International:

New Members pay a charter fee of \$35 or must submit the proper certification form waiver. International dues total \$43 annually and will be billed on a semi-annual basis. International dues for newly chartered clubs will be prorated for the months remaining in the semi-annual period ending either June 30 or December 31.

Family Members: The first family member (head of household) pays full international dues (\$43), and up to four additional family members pay only half the international dues (\$21.50). All family members pay the one-time charter fee of \$35. The Family Membership Program is open to family members who are (1) eligible for Lions membership, (2) currently in or joining the same club, and (3) living in the same household and related by birth, marriage or other legal relationship. Common household family members include parents, children, spouses, aunts and uncles, cousins, grandparents, in-laws and legal dependents.

Students between the age of majority and through age 30 pay no charter fee and half international dues. Students over age 30 and joining a Campus Lions club pay a \$10 charter fee and full international dues. New campus clubs, and clubs with a majority of students, must prepay one year international dues at the student member rate.

Graduating Leos: All graduating Leos receive a charter fee waiver. Graduating Leos, through the age of 30 who have been a Leo for at least a year and a day, pay half international dues.

Young adults, through the age of 30, receive a charter fee waiver and pay half international dues when joining a Leo Lions club. **Transfer members** pay a US\$20 charter fee and must have left their former club in good standing and transfer to the new club within 12 months.

As of June 30, 2018, LCI will not issue international dues credits for membership drops after the release of the semi-annual billings on July 1 and January 1.

State per capita dues are collected to provide revenue to defray the administrative expenses of the Multiple District and each sub-District and a Multiple District Convention Fund, annual per capita dues of \$16.00 per member per year are collected. These dues are collected in two semi-annual payments based upon a club's membership total as shown by LCI as of July 1 and January 1 of each fiscal year.

As is the case with LCI for international dues, state per capita dues are not pro-rated for members added or dropped from club membership rolls after July 1 and before December 30 and/or after January 1 and before June 30.

State per capita dues collected are used, distributed and credited as follows (/member/ year):

- State Convention Administrative Fund: \$0.45
- International Convention Fund: \$0.85
- **Promotional Fund:** \$0.35
- District Governors' International Convention Fund: \$0.35
- Sub-District Administrative Fund: \$2.50
- Public Relations/Communications Fund: \$1.50
- All State Band: \$1.50

Protocol Chairperson (*Policy #112*): One-year appointment running through June 30, 2021.






