

#### Shippensburg Lions Complete Restoration; Continue to Support Park

The **Shippensburg Lions Club**, **14-C**, has been a long-time-supporter of Shippensburg Memorial Park. That support continued during the 2023-2024 Club year with a renovation of the restrooms inside the Park.

Since collecting more than \$1,500 in 1947-1948 towards the building of Memorial Park, the Shippensburg Lions Club has worked tirelessly to make improvements to the Park. The original scoreboard, the large pavilion, and the Park plan purchase of 4.5 acres for \$5,000 are just some of the early contributions the Lions Club has made that benefit the Park.

In the 70s, the Lions members screened the ceiling and painted the large pavilion at a cost of \$1,500, one side of the roof was replaced at a cost of \$800 and \$3,600 was donated toward the purchase of more Park acres under Project 70. This amount represented half of the local cost. The Club also contributed \$3,000 to help pay the debt on the new Community Building.

In 2002, the Shippensburg Lions spent more than \$35,000 for major repairs and renovations to the food concession stand. Many members donated time and materials to help make the project successful. In the last 25 years the Club invested more than \$50,000 for Park improvements including a new roof and plywood ceiling for the large pavilion. The Lions also donated \$5,000 toward the renovation of Memorial Park Swimming Pool. In 2017, a donation for a new ice machine was made for the Pool area.

Last year the Shippensburg Lions took on the project of updating the restroom facilities directly inside the Park, a project that had been long overdue. The total cost of the project was \$18,730. The updated facilities are a welcome addition for visitors to the Park.

# Lions Club has been part of polo club for 78 years

As a third-generation polo player, I grew up immersed in the rich traditions that make this sport so special. From the divot stomping at halftime to the camaraderie shared among players and spectators alike, polo is steeped in history and customs that have been passed down through the generations.

One of the most cherished traditions in my family, and indeed for many in the small, Western Pennsylvania, polo community, is the ritual of enjoying fresh-cut french fries from the Lions Club stand on Friday nights at the

Darlington Polo Club, featuring the first lighted polo field in the world.

Darlington Polo and the Lions Club are both rich in history and a source of pride for their community. Polo players love playing on historic fields or in events that have a sense of purpose (e.g., charity matches). Thanks to the Lions Club, since 1947, every match in Darlington has had some charitable aspect.

Lions Club International, founded in 1917, is a global service organization that empowers volunteers to serve their communities and meet humanitarian needs. Interestingly, the organization's headquarters are in Oak Brook, Illinois, a city with a prominent polo tradition, catty-corner from the historic Prince of Wales polo field.

While Lions Club International's headquarters is near hallowed polo grounds, on the banks of the Little Beaver Creek, a Lions Club installation is part of the infamous polo grounds of the Darlington "Nightriders."

As you turn off Constitution Boulevard, onto the windy back roads leading to Darlington's small community (less than 250 residents), you are

greeted by an old, rusty welcome sign: "Darlington home of ... Darlington Polo Club & Lions Club International."

Darlington, a town founded in 1804, experienced steady growth throughout the 19th century, thanks to its strategic location along the Ohio and Pennsylvania Railroad. However, like many communities in the region, Darlington faced significant economic challenges in the mid-20th century, a period known as the Rust Belt era. The closing of the brick factory and other manufacturing plants led to a decline in population and a struggling local economy.

Despite these challenges, Darlington has managed to maintain a strong sense of community, with residents coming together to support one another and preserve the town's unique character. The Darlington Polo Club, founded in 1937, has been a constant presence throughout the town's history.

Like many historical polo clubs, the crowds at today's matches pale in comparison to the crowds of yesteryear when there was a huge opportunity to capitalize on the droves of people coming to polo. The Little Beaver Lions Club was organized in the spring of 1947, shortly after the Watterson family introduced polo to Darlington.

Their inaugural fundraising event was selling refreshments during homes games on Wednesday and Saturday nights, a tradition that has continued for 77 seasons, interrupted only by the pandemic in 2020.

Over the years, the concession stand has expanded from a temporary structure to its current footprint, which includes a second-floor announcer's booth and an accompanying pavilion, allowing the community to utilize the polo field for other events, including graduation parties, fishing derbies and even a couple of weddings!

It is hard to imagine polo in Darlington without the Lions Club, its past and



present volunteers and its foresight to recognize the potential to raise funds for its charitable initiatives while supporting a beloved local institution.

In 1955, one of the club's most notable achievements was recruiting Dr. Nelson Kennedy to the Darlington area. He practiced for 35 years until his retirement in 1992, serving a much-needed role in a community strife with economic hardship.

Other projects supported by the Lions Club include building residential wheelchair ramps, supporting and manning the Darlington Food Bank, providing eyeglasses and hearing aids, supporting the local fire department, financially aiding fire and flood victims and being one of the most active clubs in Pennsylvania in support of the PA Beacon Lodge Camp for the Blind.

In 2006, almost 60 years after their first fundraiser at a polo match, the Little Beaver Lions Club was elected as a Model Club—one of only 30 clubs across the United States to receive this distinction.

In a world where change is constant,

the Lions Club's 78-year presence at the Darlington Polo Club stands as a reminder of the enduring values that bind us together. Through their dedication and service, the club's members have not only contributed to the polo club's success, but have also made a lasting impact on the lives of countless individuals in the Darlington community and beyond.

When I was a child, dinner on a Friday night in the summer undoubtedly involved asking my mom for money for french fries at the Lions Club stand. Now, as I watch my toddler son gleefully munching on those same fries, I can't help but feel a sense of continuity and pride.

In Western Pennsylvania, we put french fries on everything, including salads. It's a quirky, unhealthy, regional custom that perfectly encapsulates our community's down-to-earth, unpretentious spirit. And somehow, those Lions Club fries, served up with a side of hometown pride and a dollop of Heinz ketchup (a true Pittsburgh staple), taste all the sweeter for it.

#### Warren H. Riegel, OD



**Dr. Warren H. Riegel, "Doc", 90,** passed away on Thursday, July 25, 2024.

Born on February 8, 1934, he was the son of the late Henry and Louise (Kapella) Riegel.

On February 18, 1961, he was married to Mary Louise Fairweather, who survives.

He graduated in 1959 from the Pennsylvania State College of Optometry with a Doctor of Optometry degree. After serving in the Navy, he opened his practice in Ridgway

where he worked until he retired in 2019.

Warren's life was one of service. He jumped into active participation in the community and the First Presbyterian Church, sitting on boards and participating in the Lions, Boy Scouts, Layman's Breakfast, Ridgway Ambulance, Barbershop, Ridgway Fire Department, and Elk County Concert Choir; among others.

Lion Tracey Amacher of the Ridgway Lions, believes that "Doc" Riegel was the oldest active Lion in their club's history, with 62 years of membership. On September 1, 2022, Lions of 14-J and the Ridgway Lions Club celebrated Lion Doc Riegel for 60 years of service in promoting vision and preventing blindness. Lion Riegel was a Melvin Jones recipient. Lion Tracey stated that even with "Doc's" failing health, his wife Mary Lou would bring him to meetings, and to their Halloween parade, to show support, while other club members passed out hot dogs.

In the 1970s, by faith in Christ, he began a life mission to serve the poor in other countries. He collected used eyeglasses for dispensing on missions in Latin and South America with Medical Ministry International and Eye Care International. This expanded to determining the eyeglasses prescriptions and entering them into a computer (up to 4000 pairs per project) from the Lions' Clubs in western PA and NY. His humanitarian service involved his family as well as volunteers that live locally and in Ohio, sorting and cleaning glasses, and supporting his trips in prayer.

He went on a total of 76 missions to many countries including the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Liberia, Nicaragua, Brazil, Mexico, Honduras, El Salvador, Jamaica, Colombia, Bolivia, Ecuador, and Peru. Through all the years, his enthusiasm for serving God on the next mission was never exhausted. **Lion Tracey said that** "Doc" told her that he took his grandchildren on these mission trips for eyeglasses. "What a rewarding experience for the grandchildren to see first-hand what their grandfather did to help others see better."

He is survived by his loving wife of 63 years, Mary Lou; his children, Jane Riegel (John Jairo Ruiz) of Marlborough, MA, John (Sylvia) of Newark Valley, NY, Peter (Barbara) of Greenville, PA, and Ruth Shoemaker (Scott) of Charlton, MA; his grandchildren Heidi, Leanne, Allison, Colleen, Renee, and Jessica Riegel, and Hayley and Nathan Shoemaker; and his brother, Roy (Patrice).



Date: July 7, 2021

Pennsylvania State Sales and Use Tax Exemption form awarded to the PA State Council of Lions Clubs for use by clubs during fundraising projects. This form is valid through February 2026 and may be duplicated as needed but **SHOULD NOT BE POSTED ON CLUB OR DISTRICT** websites or social media where it would be accessible by the general public. We do not want to risk losing the exemption as the result of improper use of this form.

Courtesy of Multiple District 14 Legal Counsel Lion Ashley Grimm:

"The PA State Council of Lions Clubs is registered in Pennsylvania as an Institution of Purely Public Charity under The Institutions of Purely Public Charity Act, 10 P.S. § 371.et seq. As such, it, and its subsidiary clubs, quality for an exemption from PA Sales tax. This means clubs are exempt from paying sales tax when they purchase goods or services. It does NOT mean they are exempt from remitting sales and use tax to Pennsylvania during fundraisers."

#### NO LIQUOR IN RAFFLES!

## Liquor not permitted in basket raffles

**Please be aware:** A popular staple in basket raffles is a "no-no."

After researching the matter with the Executive



Director of the PA House of Representatives' Liquor Committee and the PA Liquor Control Board, MD-14 legal counsel Lion Ashley Grimm reported that "liquor is not permitted to be in a basket for purposes of a raffle. This also includes silent auctions.


"This equates to selling liquor without a license," Lion Grimm said. "A wine and spirits gift card is permitted to be included in a raffle basket, though." Lion Grimm's research supported the opinion expressed by Lawrence County Treasurer Richard Rapone in a recent New Castle News story that had prompted MD-14 State Council Chair Bill Morgan to contact Lion Grimm.

As part of the News story, Capt. Jamie Jones of the LCB Enforcement Bureau said including any type of alcoholic beverage – be it a six pack of beer, a bottle of wine, a bottle of whiskey or the like – is a violation of the Pennsylvania Liquor Code, Title 47, and is an unclassified misdemeanor offense. The fine upon conviction is \$500, levied to the organization sponsoring the fundraiser and not the donor of the basket.

In the News story, Rapone pointed out, under the state's small games of chance law, it is illegal to host basket raffles at fundraising dinners used to benefit someone who is sick.
